In 1829 two men, Wilson and Porter, were apprehended in the state of Pennsylvania for robbing the U.S. mail. They were indicted, convicted, and sentenced to death by hanging. Three weeks before the scheduled execution, President Andrew Jackson pardoned one of the two men, George Wilson. This was followed by a strange decision which may be without precedent or parallel in our history. George Wilson refused the pardon.

This gave rise to a legal question. Can a condemned criminal refuse the presidential pardon? The question finally appeared before the United States Supreme Court. Chief Justice John Marshall handed down this verdict: "A pardon is a deed to the validity of which delivery is not complete without acceptance. It may be rejected by the person to whom it was tendered, and, if rejected, we have discovered no power in this court to force it upon him. It is not to be thought that a criminal condemned to death would refuse his pardon, but, if he should, the law remains the same."

The terms of pardon are abundantly illustrated and clarified in the book of Acts:

(Acts 2:37-41; 8:12; 8:35-39; 16:14-15; 16:30-33; 18:8)

Will you foolishly refuse God's offer of pardon?
