INTRODUCTION

"Doubt" - to waver in opinion; uncertain; hesitate; question; skeptical; suspicious; unsettled on a point or matter; apprehension; unsure; strong uncertainty as to the probability.

"An honest doubt" - to probe, search, find the meaning; to test something enough to prove it; to examine carefully; to study for the answer; concern for truth.

The challenge before us: because some accept doctrines that are unexamined; therefore, we must (1 Thess. 5:21) "Prove all things; hold fast to that which is good."

TWO EXAMPLES OF "AN HONEST DOUBT"

1. John the Baptist

(Matt. 11:1-3) "... he sent two of his disciples, and they said to Jesus, Art thou he that should come, or look we for another? ... "

John has a moment of doubt while in prison.

John is God's chosen, a preacher of repentance and the kingdom, baptized Jesus, and pointed his followers to Jesus: (Matt. 3:1-3; v13; John 1:29-30)

John takes his doubts to the right source, and Jesus gives the answer: (Matt. 11:4-6) "... Go and show John again those things which ye do hear and see ..."

Examine the evidence and eliminate the doubt.

2. Thomas (John 20:19-31)

- (v20) Jesus meets with the disciples, Thomas is absent, and presents the evidence to prove himself to be the resurrected Christ.
- (v25) The disciples meet Thomas and say, "We have seen the Christ."

Thomas does not take their word for it, and he wants to see the evidence himself: (v25)

Good for you, Thomas, because Jesus warned: (Matt. 24:4-5) "Take heed that no man deceive you ... "
(Matt. 7:15) "Beware of false prophets ... "

(v26-27) Another meeting, evidence is presented, and Thomas answers correctly.

CLOSE: To overcome doubt, to strengthen faith, go to the source (the Word of God).
